The Genesee Valley Writing Project

The Genesee Valley Writing Project (GVWP) is a collaborative school-university partnership dedicated to improving the quality of student writing and learning in PK-16 schools across the Genesee Valley region through teacher-centered professional development. The GVWP is an established site of the National Writing Project, a federally funded professional development program, and is one of more than 200 university-based project sites across the country.

The GVWP's goals, as part of the National Writing Project, are to improve student writing and learning in PK-16 classrooms; extend uses of writing in all disciplines; provide area schools, colleges, and universities with an effective professional development model; and identify, celebrate, and enhance the professional role of successful classroom teachers.

Using a teachers-teaching-teachers model, the GVWP allows participating teachers to tap into what is known about writing and teaching of writing from all sources—key research findings, important books and articles, and most importantly, the classroom practices of effective and successful teachers.

The GVWP is housed within the University of Rochester's Warner School of Education, where its director, Professor Joanne Larson, is the Michael W. Scandling Professor of Education and chair of the teaching and curriculum program.

In its mission to improving the quality of student writing and learning, the GVWP sponsors an array of programs including an annual invitational Summer Institute, school-based inservice programs, and professional development continuity programs.

The National Writing Project

The National Writing Project (NWP) is a network of local sites, including the Genesee Valley site, located in universities across 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands. Sites sponsor invitational Summer Institutes and other professional development activities for teachers of writing, across all disciplines and grade levels, throughout the year. Sites also design programs that address local issues and particular needs of schools, teachers, and students in their communities. The National Writing Project adds new sites each year with the goal of placing a writing project site within reach of every teacher in America to help all students become successful writers and learners. Today, the NWP has grown into a network of more than 200 project sites reaching more than 100,000 educators every year.

About the Summer Institute

This year, the GVWP will offer a three-week Modified Invitational Summer Institute in order to provide space for current Teacher Consultants and new fellows to deepen their writing, research, and teaching. Teachers participating in this three-week Institute will have the opportunity to build their understanding of Common Core Standards modules, do research writing and publishing, and to participate in a collaborative writing project. Furthermore, we will have the opportunity to participate in Warner's Horizons program to try out our Common Core ideas.

The 2014 Summer Institute will be held on the University of Rochester's River Campus in Warner's new building, LeChase Hall, from July 7 through 25, four days each week, from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. Fellows must attend one mandatory Pre-Institute meeting scheduled for Saturday, June 7 to be held in LeChase Hall.

Benefits of a Fellowship

Three graduate credit hours at the Warner School of Education (participants will be required to first use any employee tuition benefits or other applicable scholarships and tuition waivers, with the remainder to be covered by a Warner School tuition waiver - offer not applicable to currently matriculated Warner students); the chance to collaborate with outstanding colleagues; membership in a local and national network of Writing Project Fellows; and approximately 100 hours of professional development may be used toward your district's PD hours requirement.

Criteria for Selection

Attendance at the Modified Summer Institute is limited by invitation. Those selected will demonstrate:

- Successful classroom teaching
- Commitment to using writing in the classroom
- Openness to new ideas and approaches to teaching
- Willingness to write
